Directgov Public services all in one place	Council Tax reduction for Disabled people You may be entitled to a reduction in Council Tax if you are disabled or have a disabled person living with you. Disabled people are helped with their Council Tax through the disabled band reduction scheme. This makes sure disabled people don't pay more Council Tax because they needed a larger property due to their disability. What reduction you may get If your home is eligible, your bill will be reduced to that of a property in the next Council Tax band down. For example, a Band D property will be charged a Band C rate. Even if your property is in Band A (the lowest band) you will still receive a reduction. It will be the same in cash terms as the reductions for homes in Band B, C or D.	Having a disability does not automatically entitle you to a reduction. In summary, the requirements for a reduction are the property must be the main residence of at least one disabled person. It must also have at least one of: • An additional bathroom or kitchen required to meet the needs of the disabled person • *A room (other than a bathroom, kitchen or toilet) required to meet the needs of the disabled person, and used predominantly by them • Extra space inside the property to allow for the use of a wheelchair - wheelchairs for outdoor use only are excluded • The room or the wheelchair must also be of major importance to the disabled person's well-being, due to the extent of their disability. *An extra room does not need to have been specially built.	How to apply for a reduction You should write to or telephone your council if you think you may be entitled to a reduction on your Council Tax. You will need to apply for the reduction; your council will not automatically apply it, even if you receive care and support from social services. The council will send you a form to fill in and return. You can also find out about, and in some cases apply for, Council Tax reductions on your local council's website. These grants and offers come from government, your local council or your energy supplier. The Warm Front scheme provides heating and insulation improvements to households on certain income-related benefits living in properties that are poorly insulated and/or do not have a working central heating system. Qualifying households can get improvements worth up to £3,500 (£6,000 where oil central heating and other alternative technologies are recommended). Grants are available for improvements such as: I loft insulation draughtproofing cavity wall insulation hot water tank insulation pas, electric, liquid petroleum gas or oil heating glass-fronted fire - the Warm Front scheme can convert your solid-fuel open fire to a glass-fronted fire	The scheme is now targeted at people on certain income-related benefits and living in properties that are poorly insulated and/or do not have a working central heating system. You must own your home or rent it from a private landlord. The Warm Front scheme is only available in England. If you get a disability or income-related benefit, you may be able to get a government Warm Front Grant. This is to help pay for heating and insulation improvements to your home. 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Directgov Public services all in one place	A Disabled Facilities Grant is a local council grant. It helps towards the cost of adapting your home to enable you to continue to live there. A grant is paid when the council considers that changes are necessary to meet your needs, and that the work is reasonable and practical. A grant can be used to give you better freedom of movement into and around your home and/or to provide essential facilities within it. If you are disabled, acceptable types of work include: • widening doors and installing ramps • providing or improving access to rooms and facilities - for example, by installing a stair lift or providing a downstairs bathroom • improving or providing a heating system which is suitable for your needs • adapting heating or lighting controls to make them easier to use • improving access to and movement around the home to enable you to care for another person who lives in the property, such as a child	You can claim if you, or someone living in your property, is disabled and: you, or the person on whose behalf you are applying, are either the owner or tenant (including licensees) of the property you can certify that you, or the person on whose behalf you are applying, intend to occupy the property as your/their only or main residence throughout the grant period - currently five years A landlord may apply on behalf of a disabled tenant. An occupational therapist will look at your circumstances and can recommend the type of adaptation(s) needed. 	You cannot use direct payments to buy services for the person you care for. They can only be spent on getting the support you, as a carer, have been assessed as needing. You also cannot use direct payments to secure a service from your spouse or civil partner, close relatives or anyone who lives in the same household as you, unless that person is someone who you have specifically recruited to be a live-in employee.		
		The amount you receive will depend on the assessment your local council makes of your needs. Direct payments are made directly into your bank, building society, Post Office or National Savings account.

Local authorities must provide free lunches for eligible rupils, paid-for meals where requested and good facilities and supervision so rupils can eat safely. WaterSure. Lower bills for some metered customers. Could it help you?	The WaterSure scheme is available for certain customers with a water meter. It allows them to have their bills capped. This is to make sure that these customers don't cut back on how much water they use because they are worried about how they will pay their bill. If you qualify for WaterSure, you will pay no more than the average household bill for your company, even if you use more than the average amount of water. NB: You will not qualify for WaterSure if you use a garden sprinkler system or have a swimming pool.	To qualify for help under the WaterSure scheme, you or someone living with you, needs be entitled to receive one of the following: - council tax benefit - housing benefit - Income Support - income-based Jobseeker's Allowance - Working Tax Credit - Child Tax Credit (except families in receipt of the family element only) - Pension Credit - Income-related Employment and Support Allowance In addition, you need to either: - be responsible for 3 or more children under the age of 19 and in full-time education living in the property, or - have (or someone living in the property must have) a medical condition which requires significant additional use of water. Examples of medical conditions include weeping skin diseases (such as psoriasis), Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis. 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FOOTSTEPS	Through the Foundation, it is possible to extend much needed access to the Footsteps Centre across the United Kingdom. There are thousands of children with neurological disorders across the UK. For many of these children, the NHS is unable to provide the intensity of physiotherapy that is required. The Footsteps Foundation provides patients and their families with the financial assistance to be able to take part in the centre's innovative physiotherapy programme, which would otherwise have been out of reach. The Footsteps Foundation helps disabled children and young people to realise their full physical, cognitive and developmental potential and therefore attain the best quality of life and independence. The Foundation provides funds for the Equipment Bank, to help cover up to 50% of the cost of homecare plan, where recommended by the therapists. The Equipment Bank also assists families with the provision of specialist footwear for patients.	Applications for a grant can only be made following a Footsteps assessment, and acceptance of your child onto the Footsteps programme. One can apply for a grant once your child has a session(s) booked at Footsteps. Applications must be accompanied by proof of: income, tax credits, disability allowance and other benefits; in the form of pay slips (where applicable) and two months' bank statements showing child tax credits, DLA. Applications are considered on an individual basis and family situations are taken into consideration. Please include a covering note with your application if you feel it could help our trustees. Grants will be awarded according to need. Therefore the amount of money awarded will be a percentage of the full costs of therapy, usually 25, 50 or 75%. If your gross household income (not including benefits) exceeds £60,000 it is unlikely that we will be able to help. When a Council joins the scheme, standard locks are fitted to their accessible toilets and keys are made available to people with disabilities. Over 400 local authorities in all parts of the country have now adopted the scheme. In addition to public conveniences, toilets for disabled people provided by a wide range of other public, voluntary and commercial organisations have been fitted with the NKS lock. So it can now be found in shopping centres, country parks, railway and bus stations etc.	Radar keys are available at council offices, libraries, some Tourist Information units, and even Ebay!
